



The Fellfarers have lost two good friends recently. Steve Edgar and Rod Muncey. Both of them were remarkable people in their different ways and our lives are impoverished by the passing of both of them:

## Steve Edgar. 1946 - 2017

Although not a member at the time of his death, Steve was still actively involved with the club, attending social events and walks with his wife Val.

Steve was one of those people who quietly got on with many things, from scientific research (he was an expert in the study of diatoms) to music (played in several bands), photography (frequent winner in club competitions), cabinet-making (the new bookcases at High House) to name just a few - and he was a perfectionist at all of them. The timber boarding, walls and ceilings, upstairs at High House was all installed by Steve alone. He printed the early 'Fellfarer' magazines until he retired and sold his business, and he edited his own newsletter for his microscopy club. There is simply not enough space here to list his many accomplishments.

Steve and Val loved the Scottish Islands and they spent all of their most recent holidays there. All of their friends and family were astonished to learn, after Steve's death, that in fact the two of them had secretly got married on Islay a couple of years ago.

He had some serious health problems but was never seen without a friendly smile on his face at club events. He was a fine man and we will miss him greatly.

## Rod Muncey. 1960 - 2017

Rod too has gone from us after battling against cancer for over a year. In phone calls back to us in Kendal throughout that difficult time he remained optimistic and positive, refusing to let the illness cause him to feel bitter. He was 56 years old.

Rod's dedication to the Kendal Mountain Rescue team was recognised by the printing of an article on him in the Westmorland Gazette on 30th March.

Alec Reynolds followed that up with a letter to the Gazette, printed on 6th April: "Rod was a man of many interests. His doctorate was in Polymer Chemistry, he was an expert birdwatcher, a keen member of the Branch Line Society, and an avid collector of frankly peculiar music of all types. I first knew Rod 30 years ago when he joined the Systems Team in K Shoes. His first action was to join K Fellfarers. He was an active member of the club until his move to Plymouth, being on the Committee for several years and Social Secretary. He could be guaranteed to locate the most obscure and remote bunk houses for K Fellfarers to visit. If we were lucky, evenings there would end with Rod reciting an epic poem with appropriate gusto. He was a true one-off. He will be sadly missed by his Fellfarer colleagues."

Krysia writes: What a rare privilege to have known Rod as a friend for so many years. What to say? He was kind, insightful, thoughtful, incredibly well-read but never overbearing, a loyal friend, a committed environmentalist and conservationist who was quietly concise about the reasons for his views, a climber, caver and mountaineer who took joy in all the outdoors and all its bounties.

I had many forays walking and potholing in his company - to Scotland and the Western Isles, Corsica, Poland, the Lakes and Yorkshire. He never failed to be a witty and entertaining companion - funny and gifted in so many ways, with a wealth of songs and poems recited by heart to the delight of all.

There are so many stories to tell about my friend. I will always remember and treasure them. He never spoke ill of anyone and the world is a poorer place without him.

And from Peter Goff: "I say, I feel quite good today. I would like to lead all the climbs we do" said Rod one perfect summer's day in the ring complex in Ardnamurchen. Not having climbed for two years, he went ahead and did indeed lead all the routes. No midges, not a soul in sight; it was a superb day.

Rod was somewhat eccentric but this only added to his charm. He always played down his achievements, some of them considerable, in academia, in ecology and in the natural world in general. Not to mention British Rail and its timetables.

He was in the Fellfarers for a number of years and spent time as the Social Secretary. Rod was a member of Kendal Mountain Rescue Team for over twenty five years and did work for the RSPB counting bird species within mapped grids in the Lakes, sometimes spotting rarities but, as he said, not often.

Rod was one of the nicest, least offensive people I have ever met; never a bad word. So long mate, always a pleasure and an education.

Rod was buried in Plymouth on 7th April and Krysia and Walter organised a gathering for his Kendal friends at the Station Inn, Oxenholme to coincide with the funeral. Some Fellfarers met early and walked to the summit of the Helm beforehand. About forty Fellfarers and Mountain Rescue team members then gathered at 2.30 in the Station to share stories about our various adventures with him, about his diverse achievements and, yes, about his many eccentric ways. We'll never see his like again.

He promised us an 8 mile walk with just a few hundred feet of ascent. Remember those figures. We followed the woodland path into Coniston, resisted the temptation of the cafes, and climbed through the old station yard and Heathwaite Farm to the open moor of Banishead. Alarm bells rang when we turned left on the Walna Scar road, rather than right, but never mind, we still trusted Norman at this point. We stopped to admire "Walter's Force", the fine waterfall plunging into the dark pool at the old quarry (you'll have to ask him) and had lunch in the shelter of the spoil heaps. We followed the Tranearth bunkhouse access track into Torver and continued past Brackenbarrow Farm to the lake shore.
